PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Master's Programme in **Music Therapy** is offered within the fundamental field of **Music** and is grounded in the undergraduate fields of **Music, Psychology, and Medicine**.

Purpose of the master's degree programme: to deepen part of the disciplines studied in the field of undergraduate studies through an interdisciplinary approach, to acquire complementary competencies in other fields, and to develop students' ability to conduct scientific research.

This master's programme is offered as an argument in support of the need to train, in Romania, specialists in the interdisciplinary field of music therapy, capable of understanding and using music as a complex psychotherapeutic means, both for encouraging positive changes in human behaviour and for the treatment of physical, mental or emotional conditions.

Music therapy is included in the educational offer of dozens of universities across Europe and throughout the world. Unique in Romania, the master's degree programme in Music Therapy, taught in English, offers graduates, through its interdisciplinary specificity, numerous possibilities for professional activity and for approaching the teaching process in accordance with contemporary education, compatible with the educational requirements of the European Union.

1. LEARNING OBJECTIVES AND COMPETENCES

General Objective:

The general objective of the programme is to ensure that students acquire the competences required to select, combine, and appropriately apply knowledge, skills, values, and attitudes to use the therapeutic effects of music. This process supports the development of an individual perspective on the human psyche, grounded in the analysis of therapeutic methods and techniques used in individual and group Music Therapy.

The competence profile developed in accordance with the needs identified on the labour market and with the National Qualifications Framework, together with the learning outcomes associated with these competences, is presented synthetically below. A detailed presentation of these competences and learning outcomes is provided in the course syllabi included in the curriculum.

Professional Competences and Learning Outcomes:

PC1. Identifies the Characteristics of Music

The graduate identifies the elementary, structural, and stylistic characteristics of music from different periods and cultures.

Learning Outcomes

1.1. Knowledge

L.O. 1.1.1 The graduate collects, organises, and provides a reasoned interpretation of the theories, concepts, and principles underlying musical notation, including music reading and writing.

L.O. 1.1.2 The graduate demonstrates an understanding of knowledge in the fields of music theory and history, psychology, and medicine, and applies intercultural principles in interactions and critical analyses.

L.O. 1.1.3 The graduate integrates interdisciplinary knowledge in the evaluation of musical works required for Music Therapy.

1.2. Skills

L.O. 1.2.1. The graduate develops critical skills for the analysis and evaluation of musical works from different stylistic periods, in order to acquire a comprehensive understanding of cultural and artistic diversity.

L.O. 1.2.2 The graduate applies concepts of music theory in vocal and/or instrumental performance.

L.O. 1.2.3 The graduate writes short descriptive or analytical papers on the musical excerpts studied and uses digital tools and applications to create or edit simple musical content.

1.3. Responsibility and Autonomy

L.O. 1.3.1. The graduate autonomously analyses and evaluates the correspondence between the musical text and its sonic realisation, across a range of repertoire and styles specific to different historical periods.

L.O. 1.3.2. The graduate assumes responsibility for individual preparation and for participation in group musical activities.

PC2. Working Effectively with Diverse Personality Types

Demonstrates flexibility and the ability to work with a wide range of personality types.

Learning Outcomes

2.1. Knowledge

L.O. 2.1.1. The graduate knows the main personality typologies and their associated behavioural characteristics.

L.O. 2.1.2. The graduate understands the impact of individual differences on team dynamics and collaboration.

L.O. 2.1.3. The graduate has knowledge of communication techniques adapted to different personality styles.

2.2. Skills

L.O. 2.2.1. The graduate applies effective interaction strategies according to the personality of the interlocutor.

L.O. 2.2.2. The graduate adapts their own working style in order to collaborate effectively with different individuals.

L.O. 2.2.3. The graduate resolves conflicts or tensions arising from personality differences in a constructive manner.

2.3. Responsibility and Autonomy

L.O. 2.3.1. The graduate demonstrates flexibility in professional relationships, maintaining an open and balanced attitude.

L.O. 2.3.2. The graduate assumes responsibility for maintaining a positive working environment in diverse teams.

L.O. 2.3.3. The graduate demonstrates autonomy in managing complex interpersonal relationships, constantly adapting to the needs of the group.

PC3. Uses Clinical Musical Improvisation in Therapy

Creates musical improvisations in response to the client's communication, to enhance the individual character of the therapist–client relationship. Uses instrumental, vocal, and movement-based improvisation to respond to the client's therapeutic needs.

Learning Outcomes:

3.1. Knowledge

L.O. 3.1.1. The graduate knows the fundamental principles of musical improvisation applied in therapeutic contexts.

L.O. 3.1.2. The graduate understands how musical expression reflects and influences the client's emotional states.

L.O. 3.1.3. The graduate knows various vocal, instrumental, and movement-based improvisation techniques used in therapy.

3.2. Skills

L.O. 3.2.1. The graduate improvises musically in real time in response to the client's nonverbal and musical expressions.

L.O. 3.2.2. The graduate adapts the type of improvisation, whether vocal, instrumental, or movement-based, according to the client's therapeutic needs.

L.O. 3.2.3. The graduate integrates musical expressiveness into the therapeutic process to strengthen the therapeutic relationship.

3.3. Responsibility and Autonomy

L.O. 3.3.1. The graduate assumes the initiative in creating a safe and creative framework for the client's expression through improvisation.

L.O. 3.3.2. The graduate manages their active role in musical improvisation with discernment, while maintaining focus on the client's needs.

L.O. 3.3.3. The graduate acts autonomously in choosing the appropriate musical means to support the therapeutic process.

PC4. Manages Personal Professional Development

Contextualises and evaluates their own professional practice.

Learning Outcomes:

4.1. Knowledge

L.O. 4.1.1. The graduate understands the importance of assuming responsibility for the improvement of professional competences and for continuing professional development.

L.O. 4.1.2. The graduate understands interdisciplinarity and cultural diversity and applies intercultural principles in interactions and critical analyses.

L.O. 4.1.3. The graduate demonstrates sensitivity and respect for cultural differences in academic and professional expression.

Maintains the individual therapeutic relationship in order to activate the innate healing capacity of the person concerned, to establish active collaboration in the process of health education and healing, and to maximise the potential for healthy change.

Learning outcomes:

5.1. Knowledge

L.O. 5.1.1. The graduate knows the ethical and deontological principles applicable to the therapeutic relationship in Music Therapy.

L.O. 5.1.2. The graduate provides a reasoned account of the role of therapeutic communication and musical experiences in facilitating emotional expression, trust, and active participation in the therapeutic process.

L.O. 5.1.3. The graduate explains the ethical and professional principles governing the establishment, maintenance, and closure of the therapeutic relationship in Music Therapy practice.

5.2. Skills

L.O. 5.2.1. The graduate facilitates the active participation of the person in the therapeutic process.

L.O. 5.2.2. The graduate adapts relational strategies and Music Therapy interventions according to the clinical context and the beneficiary's sociocultural diversity.

L.O. 5.2.3. The graduate implements individualised Music Therapy interventions that make use of the therapeutic relationship.

L.O. 5.3.1. The graduate demonstrates professional responsibility in building and maintaining an ethical and effective therapeutic relationship.

L.O. 5.3.2. The graduate respects the autonomy, dignity, values, and diversity of beneficiaries at all stages of the therapeutic process.

3. ENSURING FLEXIBLE LEARNING PATHWAYS. REQUIREMENTS

The flexibility of the study programme is ensured through elective courses and optional supplementary courses. Elective courses are offered in Semesters 1–4, through specialised course packages.

4. CONDITIONS FOR ENROLMENT IN THE FOLLOWING YEAR OF STUDY. CONDITIONS FOR PASSING A YEAR OF STUDY

Enrolment in the following year of study is conditional upon meeting the progression requirements set out in the Regulation on Students' Professional Activity. A course is considered passed if the student obtains a minimum grade of 5 (five).

Enrolment in the following year of study is conditional upon obtaining a minimum of 40 credits for the courses studied.

One of the two years of study may be repeated once.

Passing a year of study is conditional upon obtaining 60 credits. Admission to the dissertation examination is conditional upon obtaining the credits corresponding to the compulsory courses, namely 120 credits.

5. CONDITIONS FOR ATTENDING OPTIONAL SUPPLEMENTARY COURSES

In addition to compulsory and elective courses, the present Curriculum also includes optional supplementary courses.

6. REQUIREMENTS FOR OBTAINING THE MASTER'S DEGREE

The conditions for taking the dissertation examination are set out in the Methodology for the Completion of Studies, approved by the University Senate. According to this methodology, admission to the dissertation examination is conditional upon passing all courses included in the curriculum.

DISSERTATION EXAMINATION

1. Period for preparing the dissertation: Semesters 3–4;
2. Period for completing the dissertation: the last 3 weeks of the final year of study;
3. Period for taking the dissertation examination: June–July;
4. Number of credits awarded for the dissertation examination: 10 credits.
